This year's Saddle Hills County Farm Family is Burnt River Ranch, owned by the Jacobs family, in Woking, AB.

"Homesteading is our passion"

Cole and Britney started Burnt River Ranch in 2018, building their home and burgeoning business literally from scratch. As young entrepreneurs and hard workers, they used their grit and determination as motivation as they battled for many hours to make the farm what it is today. Alongside their two small children, they now raise high-quality pigs, chickens, ducks, cows, and horses.

Their farm follows the traditional farming practices handed down through the generations, while also implementing new ideas and technologies. The mission is to provide the local community with ethically-raised products, including free-range eggs and grass-fed pork and poultry. The family also breeds UKC registered Sarplaninac dogs, hardy Haflinger and Haflinger cross horses, and dairy cattle. Strong proponents of education, their social media accounts and Youtube channel, are a veritable hub of information for producers, from personal insights to industry advocacy, and much more.

While their chosen way of life brings many challenges and long hours, they love the home that they've built and are deeply invested in the community around them. From volunteering on the board of the Woking Multiplex (Britney) to working as a volunteer firefighter (Cole), participating in cleaning efforts at the Hilltop Lake Campground with the Westmark Farmers League, and volunteering with the local 4-H society, they stay true to their strong work ethic and community pride.



Canadian Farmland Values Rise in First Half of 2025

Farm Credit Canada's (FCC) mid-year farmland values review shows that cultivated farmland values rose by an average of 6% in the first half of 2025. This is a modest acceleration compared to 2024, where the first half of the year saw a 5.5% increase. In the 12 months, from July 2024 to June 2025, a 10.5% increase was reported, up from the prior year at 9.3%.



Advance Payments Program (APP) Interest-Free Limit Increased


As of September 2025, the Advance Payments Program (APP) interest-free limit has been increased to \$500,000 for canola advances, for the 2025 and 2026 program years. This is the portion of the advances on which the Government of Canada pays the interest on behalf of producers and will allow canola producers access to additional cash flow and interest savings to help cover costs until they sell their products.

NWP FAIRVIEW CAMPUS CLOSURE

Northwestern Polytechnic (NWP) has announced that they are closing their Fairview campus at the end of the academic year.

In a press release issued on October 29, 2025, the school stated that the Board of Governors had made the difficult decision to close the facility, after an extensive review showed that the campus was no longer financially sustainable.

Student patterns show that the demand for programs in northwest Alberta is primarily focused on Grande Prairie or outside the region. Research shows that the majority of students attending programs in Fairview come from areas closer to Grande Prairie, where the main campus is located. Alongside this and low enrollment numbers, there is more than \$100 million in deferred maintenance required in Fairview, meaning long-term sustainability is a major challenge.

The Fairview campus will continue operations for the remainder of the 2025-26 school year, including apprenticeship programs scheduled to run from January to July 2026. Select programs will move to the Grande Prairie campus for Fall 2026, with current students receiving additional program-specific information in the coming weeks. While the Fairview campus in its current capacity will be closing, NWP is committed to helping

bring together stakeholders and facilitating conversations that explore options for the re-purposing of campus land and buildings.

KSITUAN NON-POTABLE WATER FILL

The Non-Potable Water Fill Station at the Ksituan Water Treatment Plant, is now closed for the 2025 season, reopening May 2026.

RESIDENTIAL SECURITY SYSTEMS

At the October 28, 2025 meeting, Council directed Administration to bring back Policy AD70 - Residential Security System Grant Program for review and to consider revising the policy to include high-speed internet connectivity equipment.

At the November 10, 2025 Council Meeting, Council reviewed the policy and voted to approve the amendments to Policy AD70, expanding the grant guidelines to include a \$500 setup cost for high-speed internet. The grant will be retroactive to January 1, 2024, for County residents.

VIRTUAL FOOD BANK

Pastor Wes Brown and Sharon Richard, with the Central Peace Ministerial Association, were present at the November 10, 2025 Council Meeting to request funds for the Virtual Food Bank. The food bank assists individuals and families through a regulated gift card program. Council voted to provide \$10,000 in funding to the program.



PARA CUP

Saddle Hills County will be sponsoring the Para Cup, being held from November 30 – December 6, 2025, at the Ovintiv Events Centre in Dawson Creek, with 10 world-class games featuring Canada, China, Czechia, and the USA. This is the last international competition before the 2026 Paralympics in Italy.

PROGRAM & ACTIVITY GRANTS


At the October 14, 2025 Council Meeting,
Administration presented the third round of
Program and Activity Grant applications for
Council's consideration. A total of six applications
were received, for a total of \$10,300. After
reviewing the submissions, Council approved
\$7,300 in grants to the following organizations:
Central Peace Garden Park Society (\$500), the
Gordondale Community Playgroup (\$800), the
Rycroft Community Library (\$500), Woking
Communities in Bloom (\$1,500), and the Woking
Multiplex Association (\$4,000).

The 2025 Program and Activity Grant budget was \$100,000, with a total of \$65,400 allocated during the three intakes. Council opted to use the remaining balance to provide funding of \$7,000 each to the Parent Councils of the Bonanza, Savanna, and Rycroft Schools, as well as to the Spirit River Regional Academy and Ste. Marie Catholic School. The funds are intended to be used to enhance school experiences.

ELECTION OF REEVE

At the October 28, 2025, Organizational Meeting, Councillor Gerry Richard was elected as the new Reeve for Saddle Hills County, with Councillor Jenn vanRootselaar elected as Deputy Reeve, for the 2025-26 term.





2025 has seen an incredible amount of progress on the Central Peace Regional Water Project, including awarding the largest tender in County history, awarding Contract 1 to the lowest bidder, Greenfield Construction Ltd., for a total of \$40,328,054.94, plus GST. The contract will see the River Intake and Raw Water Transfer Station portion of the Central Peace Water Supply System completed, putting the region one step closer to realizing their potable water goals.

ABOUT THE PROJECT

The project is a joint effort by the G5 group of municipalities, consisting of Birch Hill County, the MD of Spirit River, Saddle Hills County, the Town of Spirit River, and the Village of Rycroft, to provide a reliable source of potable water for the region.

Under the scope of work for the current project, MPE Engineering Ltd. is providing engineering services for the first two phases of overall project, with Saddle Hills County as the managing partner. Phase 1 & 2 of the project is currently split into three contracts:

Contract 1: New Raw Water Intake on the Peace River and a Raw Water Pumping Stations. This part of the project is currently underway.

Contract 2: Drill through the Peace River Valley and install a steel pipeline. This was awarded to contractors, Option Excavating, and is now considered complete.

Contract 3: Raw Water Pipeline to the Town of Spirit River and the Village of Rycroft.

MPE Engineering was contracted to complete the design of the Central Peace Water Treatment Plant, with 90% funded by an Alberta Water for Life Grant. Saddle Hills County purchased two quarters of land for the project, with the Central Peace Regional Water Treatment Plant currently being designed on one of them.

Greenfield Construction commenced work in July 2025, beginning with the construction of an access road down the hill to the raw water transfer station location. Bulk excavation of the project site continued through the month of September, with an access roadway down to the river's edge for the temporary trestle bridge construction now complete. Excavation of the 28m deep wet well was completed at the end of October 2025. Construction of the trestle bridge began in mid-October 2025, with a completion date set for November 2025. Installation of the temporary cofferdam isolation system for the river intake structure shall proceed following completion of the trestle bridge. Construction completion of the Contract 1 facility remains scheduled for late 2027.

The original project budget for Phases 1 & 2 was \$40 million, with \$16 million provided by the Investing in Canada Infrastructure Program, \$20 million provided by the Alberta Water for Life Grant Program, and \$4 million provided by Saddle Hills County. The new project budget, as of May 2025, is now estimated at \$105,864,986.54.

In June 2024, an additional \$22,700,000 was received through the Water for Life Grant Program, giving the project a funding total of \$25,222,000, with a 10% municipal contribution. The G5 municipalities are responsible for 10-15% of total project costs.


Phases 3 and 4 of the project are split into three contracts:

Contract 4: Raw Water Storage and Supply.

Contract 5: Construction of a Regional Water Treatment Plant.

Contract 6: Water Treatment Plant Tie-ins to the Town of Spirit River, Village of Rycroft, and Hamlet of Woking.

In May 2025, an additional \$12,787,395.54 was received through the most recent Water for Life Grant program submission to be put towards Contract 4.




