The Saddle Hills County Health Clinic is now open and accepting patients!







The Clinic is run by Nurse Practitioner, Palvi Sharma, and specializes in providing primary care services for both acute and chronic conditions.

Nurse Practitioners in Alberta, are authorized to diagnose and treat common illnesses and injuries, prescribe medications, order and interpret diagnostic tests, and provide health education. If your condition requires specialized care beyond the scope of a Nurse Practitioner's expertise, they can refer you to another healthcare provider or specialist for further evaluation and treatment.

BOOKING AN APPOINTMENT

AT THE SADDLE HILLS COUNTY HEALTH CLINIC

Saddle Hills County residents can book an appointment using our Online Booking System, available at saddlehills.ab.ca/Saddle-Hills-Health-Clinic

First time users will be guided through setting up an account through our provider, Medeo. Once activated, patients can use this account to request appointments with Nurse Practitioner Sharma.

Please note, that until you receive a confirmation email that your appointment time has been accepted, the appointment is not confirmed. Once confirmed, you will receive a second email with the date and time of your appointment.

Please remember to bring your Alberta Health Card, Photo ID, a list of current medications (including dosages), and any relevant medical records or test results with you to your appointment.

Frequently Asked Questions

How can I request prescription refills?

Prescription refills can be requested through a scheduled appointment. Once a prescription refill has been requested, please allow 24-48 hours for processing. Unfortunately, prescriptions are not able to be collected in B.C.

How do I access test results?

You can access your tests results as soon as they are available, generally within 24 hours, at myhealth **alberta.ca/myhealthrecords**. In some cases, you may have access to results before the healthcare provider (ie. Nurse Practitioner Sharma) receives them, and the clinician may not see your results until the next clinical day. Please do not assume you will be automatically contacted if your test results are abnormal. If you do not hear from us, please follow up.

Are telehealth appointments available?

Yes, our clinic is pleased to offer telehealth appointments for certain types of visits. However, we do request that your first appointment be in-person.



Are you a farmer or rancher with marginal or uneconomical lands?

ALUS helps you establish wetlands, tree planting, native prairie, pollinator habitat, and many other projects. Over 1,700 farmers and ranchers have enrolled more than 52,000 acres of land in the ALUS program.

Saddle Hills County is new to the ALUS Program, launching in June 2024.

As the program is in its infancy stages, ALUS Saddle Hills is looking for agricultural producers and professionals to join our program, as either a member of the Partnership Advisory Committee (PAC) or to provide land for ecosystem services.

Saddle Hills County contains approximately 381 farms, covering 535,279 acres. We believe our producers and communities will benefit from the farm base conservation program that ALUS provides.

Partnership Advisory Committee (PAC)

The Partnership Advisory Committee (PAC) is critical to the ALUS model. It ensures that the local programs are directed, implemented, and managed by the communities they affect.

The PAC is made up of at least 50% local producers, with the remainder filled by local government and those within the community with the environmental knowledge to implement the programs effectively. The composition of the PAC is important to ensure that the many perspectives of the community and local context are at the forefront of ALUS program development. The PAC is responsible for deciding which ALUS projects will move forward and the amount of funding allocated to projects. The varied expertise of the members allows them to make well-informed decisions, with respect to the local economy, environment, and community.

On-Farm Efficiency Program Now Accepting Applications

The On-Farm Efficiency Program (OFEP) is now open and accepting applications! The program aims to support producers in achieving environmental benefits by improving the efficient use of agricultural outputs.

Each qualified applicant is eligible for a maximum of \$150,000 in funding, over the duration of the program term (2024-2028). The minimum funding per successful application is \$500.



Supporting Future Farmers with AFSC's Next Generation Loan

Alberta's government is supporting future farmers and ranchers through changes to Agriculture Financial Services Corporation's Next Generation Loan program. By expanding the eligibility and updating the terms of the Next Generation Loan Program, the aim is to make it easier for young producers to enter and re-enter the agricultural industry, give greater opportunities to new and growing operations, promote succession, and encourage more people to get into farming.

Clouds Pest Identification by Toso Bozic, Tree Expert



Aphids are among the most frequently and widely encountered insects on trees, shrubs, and ornamental garden plants. These small, sapsucking insects can appear in very high numbers for extended periods of time causing damage to a wide range of trees, impacting their health, growth, and overall productivity.

Aphids are prey for numerous beneficial insects, such as ladybugs, lacewings, and parasitic wasps. These natural enemies help regulate aphid populations.

PEST ID & SYMPTOMS

Aphids belong to the superfamily Aphidoidea, encompassing thousands of species. The tiny insects have an oval-shaped body, typically measuring 1-10 mm in length, exhibit a range of colours, including green, black, brown, and yellow, with a few species even appearing bright red in colour. Some aphids conceal their bodies by coating themselves with waxy threads, earning them the name 'woolly aphids'.

Aphids reproduce both sexually and asexually. The vast majority of all aphids, regardless of their form, are female. Males, when they do occur, are usually only present in late summer and early autumn, during the last outdoor generation. During favourable conditions, particularly in spring and summer, aphids reproduce parthenogenetically, where females give birth to live young without mating. This allows for rapid population growth. In autumn, as conditions deteriorate, many aphid species switch to sexual reproduction, producing eggs that can survive over winter and hatch in spring.

Aphids exhibit varying degrees of host specificity. Some are generalists, feeding on a wide range of plants, while others are specialists, targeting specific tree species. They are inefficient feeders and some aphids will produce excessive amounts of a sticky substance called honeydew. Ants farm aphids for their honeydew, offering protection from predators in return. This mutualism can complicate aphid management, as ants can aggressively defend their aphid partners.

MAJOR FIBER CONSTRUCTION IN WOKING NOW COMPLETE

BLUEBERRY FIRE HALL UPDATE

Construction work began on the Blueberry Fire Hall in June, with foundations beginning to be laid at the new site.

At the October 30, 2023 meeting, Council accepted the proposal submitted by K&M Building Contractors (2004) Ltd. for the construction of the new fire hall and directed Administration to enter into a contract based on the proposal.

ASPHALT CHIPSEALING

Crews completed asphalt chipsealing in August, to extend the life of asphalt paving on Range Road 93, from Highway 681 to Township Road 830, and on Range Road 102, for one mile south from Highway 49.



MEMORIAL BENCH AT SPRING LAKE

Kayla Stremel, whose father recently passed, sent in a request to Council to be allowed to install a memorial bench in the Spring Lake Day Use Area, in his honour. In her request, Kayla stated that Spring Lake was "an exceptionally special place to him, and to me" and that they camped there nearly exclusively all of her life, where he taught her how to fish and where they shared some of her most cherished memories. Council voted unanimously in favour. Installation and location will be coordinated with County Administration, with funding to be covered by the family.

RV SANI-DUMP & WATER FILL

At the December 5, 2023, Capital Budget Meeting, Council voted to add \$25,000 to the 2024 Interim Capital Budget to construct an RV Sani-Dump and Water Fill Station in the Hamlet of Woking, with the site selection to be decided at a later date. Administration reviewed several locations and identified a County owned property with sanitary line access, away from residences. Upon review of the proposal put forward, Council voted unanimously to proceed with the construction of the RV Sani-Dump and Water Fill Station on Lot 1, Block 1, Plan 1120506, south side of 51st Avenue, in Woking.



TRUCK FILL VOLUMES

At the June 11, 2024 meeting, Council asked Administration to look into possible ways to display real-time truck fill volumes on the Saddle Hills County website or through an app. After liaising with both staff and outside contractors, Administration brought a report back to Council at the August 13 meeting, including a method to have the volumes displayed on the county website and a quote for estimated costs. After discussion, Council voted unanimously to bring the quote back to the 2025 budget deliberations for review.

Ensuring the future of Saddle Hills County and its residents has been one of Council's goals for many years. From things like ensuring the long-term viability of our roads and infrastructure to the success of our youth and, most recently, finding new solutions to rural healthcare and internet access, providing reliable long-term solutions to access important resources like water is just another way Saddle Hills County, with the help of our G5 neighbours, is hoping to support the ongoing economic growth and sustainability of the Peace Region community.

We are pleased to formally announce that the Central Peace Regional Water Project has been awarded an additional \$22,700,000 in grant funding from the provincial government, through the Water for Life Grant Program. The program covers up to 90% of costs for eligible projects. This is additional partial funding to help complete Phases 1 and 2 of the project, a collaborative effort between the G5 municipalities of Birch Hills County, the MD of Spirit River, Saddle Hills County, the Town of Spirit River, and the Village of Rycroft. Phases 1 and 2 consist of pumping water from the Peace River to raw water reservoirs in the Town of Spirit River and Village of Rycroft.

Saddle Hills County Administration has been working with contractors, MPE Engineering Ltd., on this project. In 2023, MPE Engineering requested quotations for this part of the project (Contract 2). Contract 2 covers the construction 2.4 km of waterline on the south bank of the Peace River, including 1.8 km of underground steel pipeline, drilled to 40 m below the surface. Due to the quotations being substantially higher than the original estimate, the project was placed on hold until additional funding could be confirmed. Thanks to the additional funding provided by the Government of Alberta through the Water for Life Grant, the project is now able to continue.

At the August 27, 2024, Council Meeting, Councillors reviewed the original 2023 Request for Proposals for Contract 2 and reached out to prior bidders. The lowest bidder, Option Excavating, confirmed their interest in completing the project and Council voted unanimously to enter into a contract with them, at a cost of \$14,264,931.60 (plus GST) for the 2.4 km of waterline.

Currently, MPE Engineering is working on the design of the pumping station and intake line, which requires additional geotechnical work to complete and is scheduled for mid-September.

To date, the funds allocated for this project total \$65,222,222, with 90% covered by grant funding from the Governments of Alberta and Canada. These funds will help to complete the River Intake, Pumping Station, and the first portion of one of the raw water pipelines needed to finish the overall project. The final cost of the project is yet to be determined.

Alongside this, Saddle Hills County was also awarded \$280,000 through the Province of Alberta's Drought and Flood Protection Program, for the Ksituan Additional Raw Water Storage project. This project entails the construction of a supplemental raw water storage facility to help supply the Water Treatment Plant during times of potential drought or low streamflow.

Helping Seniors Conneces

Saddle Hills County was excited to be invited to the unveiling of the new GENIE kiosk at the Central Peace Health Complex Long-Term Care Facility in Spirit River, on June 25, 2024. The kiosk and simple, easy-to-use software will allow residents to more easily connect with loved ones.

The GENIE software is an easy-to-use messaging platform designed for seniors in long-term care to use independently, to remain connected with their loved ones.





The software consists of three components, a GENIE kiosk (pictured), and Ambient Access website and mobile app. The GENIE kiosk remains in the long-term care unit for residents' use, while family members and friends can message them and manage their account through the Ambient Access online services.

The kiosk will display a resident's profile, showing them any messages they have received, including voice messages and recordings, videos, texts, and pictures, which they can then reply to by picking up the receiver and recording their response. The response is then sent to the loved one to view at their convenience. While the communication isn't real-time, it allows residents to keep in touch with loved ones and long distance family members and friends on their own time and at their own pace. The kiosk also features a rotating home screen, where the onsite kiosk manager can add things such as calendars, events, happy birthday messages, and more, for residents to view when accessing the machine.

Judy Brown and Diane Chabot (pictured) were present at the unveiling, along with members of the residents/family council, to view an online demonstration of the software. The 15 current unit residents and their family members are all planning to use the kiosk for future communications.

Saddle Hills County provided the funding of \$10,000 for the project. The County is proud to be able to support local residents in long-term care through the implementation of this software, and is grateful for the hard work of carers, volunteers, and staff, who make things like this possible.
